After your Sedation

A capable adult will need to take you home by car or taxi – ideally not public transport – and remain with you overnight. If arrangements have not been made for someone to accompany you after treatment, you may not be able to go home after the procedure.

After your sedation for 24–36 hours or longer if you feel unwell:

- Do not sign any legal documents, agreements or cheques
- Do not operate machinery or drive or ride a bicycle
- You should arrange for someone to assist in looking after your children
- Avoid drinking alcohol
- We also recommend avoiding posting on social media until after this period

Are there important instructions for afterwards?

Sedation may make you unsteady on your feet. Please be careful on stairs and have a capable adult with you if you feel unsteady.

Your doctor will give written instructions about further treatment to follow at home.
